Center highlights from the Director

Although the Center for Animal Welfare Science is still very early in its development, since appointment of its first Director in February of 2014, quite a lot has happened.

Center faculty hires

As part of the provost-funded initiative to create CAWS, several Center faculty were hired:

CAWS Steering committee

A steering committee was appointed in March, 2014 with constituents chosen to broadly represent multi-disciplinary and multi-species expertise and interest in the respective sciences of animal welfare. Committee members include:

The steering committee has established mission and objective statements to be revised as needed over time, and has prioritized short term Center goals and activities, which are to be

expanded on with input from Center members, who are soon to be recruited. Currently, the mission statement and objectives are:

Mission: The Purdue Center for Animal Welfare Science facilitates the well-being of animals through interdisciplinary discovery, learning and engagement. We identify animal welfare challenges, approaches to alleviate them, and education to advance socially responsible decision-making on animal care, management, and policy.

Objective: Facilitate inter-disciplinary collaborations on animal welfare science.

The short term goals were:

- Establish and administer travel fellowships for students and faculty to attend and present at conferences in animal welfare science
- Develop a one day symposium on animal welfare
- Develop a seminar series on animal welfare
- Develop at least one collaborative grant proposal on animal welfare science
- Develop at least two white papers relative to animal welfare science
- Develop an RFP for seed funding for Center members

Formalizing the Center & membership

Paperwork has been submitted to formally recognize CAWS at Purdue University; the official call for membership will follow shortly after approval.

CAWS activities

Sponsorships. CAWS was recognized as an official sponsor of the regional meeting of the International Society of Applied Ethology held in May 2014 at Michigan State University.



Awards. The inaugural CAWS graduate student travel fellowship was awarded to Jiaying Hu (Animal Sciences; advisor, Dr. Heng-Wei Cheng, USDA ARS LBRU) to present her research on hen well-being at the 2014 Poultry Science Association's annual conference; CAWS intends to administer scholarships twice annually to facilitate graduate student presentations of their work related to animal welfare. CAWS and Think Policy. CAWS is represented by Director Croney on the new Purdue Think Policy Initiative Group, which is aimed at increasing Purdue's presence as a policy shaper by creating databases, courses, white papers and reports for think tanks.

CAWS Collaborations

New collaborative partnerships established with USDA APHIS Center for Animal Welfare, the Pet Industry Joint Action Committee, World Pet Association and Pet Food Institute on companion animal welfare have resulted in a grant of \$900,000 to establish and scientifically evaluate standards for the care and welfare of breeding dogs. Led by Dr. Croney, this joint venture includes multiple members of the CAWS steering committee, as well as several prospective CAWS members in the Colleges of Veterinary Medicine and Agriculture. Additional research collaborations are also in development with Fair Oaks Farms/IN Pork Producers Association, Zoetis and several other organizations.
